




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A Message from the Dean:

Howard University College of Pharmacy continues to stand at the forefront of pharmacy education, proudly maintaining its position as one of the nation's leading producers of African American pharmacists. This year, we celebrate not only our enduring legacy but also the exciting momentum we are building as we chart a bold course for the future.

In alignment with our strategic plan, we have made substantial progress across the core pillars of **Teaching and Learning, Research**, **Leadership**, **and Practice**. Our commitment to innovation and excellence is reflected in the refinement of our curriculum, the cultivation of strategic partnerships, and impactful contributions to healthcare policy and public service.

Highlights from the Year in Review

- Strategic Academic Partnerships: We established collaborations with six colleges and universities to expand student recruitment efforts and increase access to pharmacy education.
- Significant Grant Awards: The college was awarded approximately \$9.5 million in research and programmatic grants, further enhancing our capacity for discovery and academic enrichment.
- Advocacy in Public Health Policy: Through targeted lobbying efforts, we supported the expansion of buprenorphine access to address the national opioid crisis—an initiative that underscores our engagement in pressing healthcare challenges.
- Curriculum Innovation: We implemented key curriculum changes, including structural reforms and the creation of multiple academic tracks, designed to enhance educational flexibility and relevance.
- **Fellowship Growth**: We have an impressive 40 fellows in our pharmaceutical industry fellowship program, affirming our impact on workforce development and leadership preparation.
- Global Engagement: Our international footprint continues to expand through the growth of academic and research partnerships abroad.
- Provider Status Achievement: In a major policy milestone, District of Columbia pharmacists were granted provider status, significantly expanding their scope of practice.

 NTDP Program Sunset: After 21 years of impactful service, the Non-Traditional Doctor of Pharmacy (NTDP) program has enrolled its final class and will formally conclude upon their graduation in fall 2026.

Our faculty continue to demonstrate excellence in scholarship and innovation as we had an exceptional year of accomplishments. Collectively, they produced incredible publications, poster and podium presentations, received competitive grants, prestigious awards, and book publishings. These achievements highlight only a fraction of the faculty's unwavering commitment to advancing pharmaceutical research, education, and practice on both national and global levels.

As the **only pharmacy school in Washington**, **D.C.**, we played a role in advocating for provider status under the Health Occupations Revision General Amendment Act of 2023 (HORA 2023). In January 2024, our students, D.C.-licensed faculty, and I signed letters in support of this vital legislative effort. We provided guidance to the D.C. Committee on Health, emphasizing how our curriculum aligns with the evolving roles of pharmacists in patient care.

We owe special recognition to Dr. Yolanda McKoy-Beach, faculty member and President of the Washington, D.C. Pharmacy Association, for her unwavering dedication and leadership in this advocacy effort.

As we reflect on this year's accomplishments, we remain deeply committed to our mission, as we advance health equity, empower communities, and prepare the next generation of leaders in pharmacy. Our guiding values—truth (Veritas) and service (Utilitas)—continue to illuminate our path forward.

PACE International Projects

Howard University College of Pharmacy and the Pharmaceutical Care and Continuing Education Center continued its mission to provide structured, reciprocal international pharmacy training opportunities, which included mentoring and hands-on practice experience, for the purpose of positively impacting direct patient care and clinical outcomes both locally and globally. Our vision is to be a leader in international pharmacy initiatives, exemplifying the value and importance of teaching culturally competent care in pharmacy practice.

Accelerating Control of the HIV Epidemic in Nigeria (ACE 5) ECEWS/USAID project, with an award of \$400,000 to implement pharmacy-related technical assistance activities in year 2 of the project.

- Supporting pharmacists in HIV prevention, treatment, and care intervention
- Strengthening pharmacovigilance monitoring, pharmacy systems and building capacity of pharmacy personnel in HIV prevention and care
- Increased access to high quality pharmacybased prevention, care, and support services

The purpose of the DSD program is to increase the efficiency of ART service delivery and improve treatment outcomes among stable ART clients who have achieved viral load suppression status. HUCOP aims to reduce morbidity and mortality experienced by HIV patients.



- Conduct Disease Control Surveillance Assistant (DCSA) training
- Providing essential access to pathways to economic empowerment through education and employment
- Deployed DSCAs to their respective districts to address under-resourced communities





Honoring Dr. Olu A. Olusanya



Celebrating a Legacy: Dr. Olu A. Olusanya Retires After 50 Years of Service—On Thursday, April 11, 2024, Howard University's College of Pharmacy honored Dr. Olu A. Olusanya for his extraordinary dedication and 50 years of service as he begins his retirement. His contributions have been instrumental to the College's growth, success, and legacy of excellence in pharmaceutical education.

Dr. Olusanya's journey into the field of pharmacy began at an early age, inspired by his father, who had once pursued a pharmacy degree but was unable to complete it. Determined to follow that dream, Dr. Olusanya received his early education in Nigeria, earning a Higher School Certificate and completing two years of advanced science courses after high school. With a bold spirit and a deep commitment to his education, he made the life-changing decision to move to the United States to continue his studies.

In Fall 1967, Dr. Olusanya began his college education at Howard University's College of

Pharmacy, where Dean Chauncey Cooper—the first dean of the College—presided. He vividly recalls his orientation day, remembering a statement from Dean Cooper that left a lasting impression: "Look to your right, look to your left—some of you may not be back next semester." A sobering message that resonated with many, including Dr. Olusanya, as it became a motivator throughout his academic journey.

In May 1972, driven by a passion for continued learning, Dr. Olusanya began his Doctor of Pharmacy (PharmD) degree at the University of Minnesota. At the time, there were only a handful of schools offering clinical pharmacy programs, and his class consisted of just nine students. By May 1974, he successfully completed his degree. Just a few months later, on July 1, 1974, he had started a new job—unaware of the profound impact it would have on generations to come.

Dr. Olusanya returned to Howard's College of Pharmacy–this time, as a member of the faculty. He became one of the first three clinical faculty members at the College and went on to serve in numerous leadership roles, including Department Chairman for over 20 years. His unwavering commitment to education, mentorship, and the advancement of pharmacy practice has left a lasting mark on generations of students and colleagues.

Howard University's College of Pharmacy extends its deepest gratitude to Dr. Olusanya for his decades of service and dedication. His legacy will continue to inspire, and we wish him the very best in this next chapter of life. "Dr. Olusanya was deeply dedicated and truly loved his department, committed to helping his faculty grow. He is a kind man, loved by everyone who knows him.
